Learning to Learn and Study Skills Tips

All Leaving Cert students this year have engaged in a Learning to Learn study skills class with Ms. O'Loughlin. This involves completing an online study skills course with The Super Generation exam skills experts. The Learning to Learn programme demonstrates the importance of planning through the use of a weekly study plan, using a traffic light system to highlight areas that need to be inputted into the study plan and also the importance of spacing out learning, the use of pretesting and having a growth mindset.

Students have also experienced a half day study skills seminar with Ray Langan from "Rayse the Game" which reinforced the points above and also highlighted the importance of wellbeing through time to rest and plan for the week ahead.

Mr. Cunningham has also paid for each Leaving Cert student to have a premium Study Click account so as each student has access to a system that will allow each student to pre test using on line quizzes and full access to past leaving cert exam questions, marking schemes and video blogs on each subject. Oral Guidance.

Tips for succeeding in the French/German Oral

- **Prepare** and learn as much as you can- The same topics come up over and over again in the oral so make sure you know these topics really well such as (Moi-meme, Ma famille, Mon quartier, Mon école etc..)
- Be careful of your tenses! Questions will be asked in the in the past, present and future. Also there are certain key words which will help you identify the tense the question is being asked in, for example

- **Try lead the conversation** Rather than waiting for the examiner to ask you questions (sometimes in areas you may not be as prepared for) try and steer the conversation towards areas you have lots to say about.
- **Prepare a document!** In the French oral, you have the choice to bring a document, it is a good idea to prepare one, as it allows you to speak on a topic you have prepared very well for
- Take you time- Many students are nervous when doing oral exams and tend to race through what they are saying, this can lead to them making mistakes and sometimes it can be difficult to understand what they are saying. Slow down! This can also give you time to compose yourself.
